

Ambassadorial Scholarships

Ambassadorial Scholarships were designed to further international understanding and goodwill and provide for study abroad in countries where Rotary clubs are located. During their studies abroad, Ambassadorial Scholars acted as "ambassadors of goodwill." Through appearances before Rotary clubs and districts, schools, civic organizations and other forums, the scholars represented their homelands and work to further international understanding.

The Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships program was the world's largest privately sponsored international scholarship program. Focused on humanitarian service, personal diplomacy, and academic excellence, the program has sponsored Rotary Scholars abroad since it began in 1947. The program was terminated at the end of Rotary Year 2012-2013.

University Academic Scholarships

A *University Academic Scholarship Program* is available to the District through the Global Grant process. Grants are for a minimum of \$30,000 (\$15,000 from the District/Club/private and \$15,000 from Rotary International.) The program promotes Rotary's goal of world peace, goodwill, and understanding through graduate study in another country based on academic performance in one or more of the following areas of study:

- 1. Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- 2. Disease prevention and treatment
- 3. Water and sanitation
- 4. Maternal and child health
- 5. Basic education and literacy
- 6. Economic and community development

World Peace Fellowships

The *Peace Fellowship Program* promotes Rotary's goal of world peace, goodwill, and understanding. In these uncertain times, there is a growing demand for well-trained international leaders. The challenges of the 21st century require people skilled in the art of diplomacy, mediation and conflict resolution. Rotary International developed the World Peace Fellowship program to meet this need.

Rotary seeks non-Rotarian professionals interested in expanding their knowledge of peace building, conflict resolution, and mediation. Each year, Rotary selects up to 50 Fellows to study for a master's degree and up to 50 Fellows for the short-term certificate program at one of six Rotary Centers located at prestigious universities around the world.

Participants in the master's degree program gain access to:

- Rotary-funded graduate study toward a master's degree
- Training in the root causes of conflict, theories of international relations, and effective models of cooperation, conflict resolution, and negotiation
- A growing network of committed alumni employed around the world in diplomacy, government, nongovernmental organizations and private corporations
