

What are global grants?





Global Grants

- Large, longer-term projects
- Alignment with one or more of Rotary's six areas of focus
- They must have sustainable, measurable outcomes
- there is an international partnership between Rotary Clubs
- Require a \$30,000 minimum budget
- World Fund match minimum \$15,000









Global Grants - District 6450

- The Rotary Foundation requires a partnership between at least two clubs in different countries – the Host Club and the International Club. The Host Club is where the project is done. Often our clubs are the International Club in a grant.
- Our District requires a sponsoring club to have at least two other District clubs participate in the Global Grant in some way, including financially, and three other clubs if the budget is over \$100,000.
- Work with the Grants Committee for preparation and approval of the grant before it is locked and submitted to the Rotary Foundation.
- Use the District Global Grants Checklist as a guide.



Areas of focus

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development















Sustainability

Sustainability means providing long-term solutions to community needs that the beneficiaries can maintain after grant funding ends.

It is achieved through several steps in the process.





Rotarian Involvement

- Make sure Rotarians in each Club are actively participating in some manner
- Provide a detailed list of tasks for host club and international club Rotarians





How do I get started?









Global Grant Matching

- The World Fund matches Rotarian and non-Rotarian cash contributions 50%, and matches District DDF 100%
- District 6450 matches Club cash contributions dollar for dollar up to \$10,000 for most grants, \$12,000 for grants over \$100,000
- Extra DDF available this year for clean water and food security grants (submit to Grants Committee by 6/30/18)
 - Up to \$2,000 of DDF
- Extra DDF (\$1,000) to pitch your project today




Global Grant Math

Club Cash:	District Match DDF: (100% up to \$12,000)	World Fund Match: (50% of Club Cash + 100% of District DDF)	Total:
Kankakee \$1,000	\$1,000	\$500 + \$1,000	\$3,500
Joliet \$5,000	\$5,000	\$2,500 + \$5,000	\$17,500
Naperville \$6,000	\$6,000	\$3,000 + \$6,000	\$21,000
Total: \$12,000	\$12,000	\$18,000	\$42,000

If this is a Clean Water grant, add an extra \$1,500 for DDF, and \$1,500 for Word Fund matching, for a total funding of \$45,000

- There are no application deadlines either by Rotary Foundation or by District 6450





Start with the community



Identify a need and develop a solution that builds on community strengths and aligns with local values and culture.



Community assessment

Examines strengths, weaknesses, needs, assets

Helps to identify relevant opportunities for projects

The need is not what we see, but what the community sees.

Align with an Area of Focus

- Review Rotary's areas of focus policy statements
- Identify most appropriate area of focus based on needs assessment
- Design project based on identified area of focus
- Ensure that all project activities relate to the area of focus goals

AREAS OF FOCUS POLICY STATEMENTS

With respect to the areas of focus policy statements, The Rotary Foundation notes that

- The goals of the Foundation are to increase efficiency in grant processing and ensure quality of funded projects;
- 2. The content of each policy statement is intended to represent eligible and ineligible activities;
- 3. Eligible activities reflect those that Rotary clubs and districts have most often implemented;
- 4. Project planning is a bottom-up and host dub/district-driven process;
- 5. All grant requests must comply with the policy statements related to each area of focus.

PEACE AND CONFLICT PREVENTION/RESOLUTION

Rotary supports the training, education, and practice of peace and conflict prevention and resolution.

Area of Focus Statement of Purpose and Goals

TRF enables Rotarians to promote the practice of peace and conflict prevention/resolution by:

- 1. Training leaders, including potential youth leaders, to prevent and mediate conflict;
- 2. Supporting peace-building in communities and regions affected by conflict;
- Supporting studies for career-minded professionals related to peace and conflict prevention/resolution.

Parameters for Eligibility

TRF considers activities targeting the following to be within the scope of the peace and conflict prevention/resolution area of focus:

- Community activities targeting non-Rotarian participants, including conferences, trainings, and camps, in support of nonviolence, peace-building, and human rights;
- Facilitated conflict resolution workshops related to topics addressing community needs such as
 policy development, business activities across conflict lines, educational reform, and peace
 journalism;
- 3. Supporting initiatives addressing psychological effects of conflict;
- 4. Educating youth on preventive measures to avoid conflict;
- Training programs or campaigns to address negative social dynamics in a community, including but not limited to anti-gang efforts and those to overcome radical differences;

Encourage local ownership


Identify key community members who can help pioneer lasting improvements.

- Include detailed information for each training opportunity
 - Frequency
 - Curriculum
 - Target audience
 - Trainer





Buy local

Purchase equipment and technology from local sources.





Find local funding

Get local funding through governments, hospitals, companies, and other organizations.



Measure your success

Develop clear and measurable project outcomes and determine how you will collect your data.





Measuring success


- Be specific about who will benefit and what benefits they will receive
- Establish baseline data
- Set benchmarks
- Specify measurement methods
- Create a timeline
- Show that you will make a difference



After Approval

- Approval of the Global Grant is just the start.
- After that:
 - Collect all of the funds committed by other Clubs
 - Either to the Rotary Foundation (5% admin fee) or into your Club or the Host Club's separate account for the Global Grant
 - Implement the Project
 - Inform your partners of Project progress regularly
 - Prepare and submit formal reports to Rotary
